The COVID-19 vaccines are safe and they work. Talk to your doctor if you are concerned about the vaccines.

Why should I get vaccinated?

There are many reasons to get the COVID-19 vaccine:

- People of color are more likely to get sick or die from COVID-19 because their social environment puts them at greater risk.
- You can reduce your risk by getting vaccinated and by making sure those around you are also vaccinated.
- Studies show that COVID-19 vaccines help prevent hospital stays and death from COVID-19.
- The vaccine was carefully tested in tens of thousands of people, including Black, Latino, Native American and Asian people worldwide.
- The vaccines keep us safe and will help end the pandemic.

Truths about the COVID-19 vaccines:

 The vaccines will not give you COVID-19. They don't contain live virus.

The vaccines won't change your DNA. The vaccines won't make you infertile.

How do I get a vaccine?

1. The Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are given as 2 doses. The Janssen/Johnson & Johnson vaccine requires just 1 dose.



2. After your shot, you'll be monitored for any allergic reactions. These are rare, however.







3. You'll then get a card recording which vaccine you received.



4. There is no out-of-pocket cost to receive the COVID-19 vaccine.
