



Pregnancy Care Clinicians:

The Michigan Plan for Appropriate and Tailored Healthcare in Pregnancy (MiPATH)

You can use this grid to think about which pregnancy care clinician is the best fit for you for your medical care. You will review your preference with the nurse during your intake call. If you know you would like to see a specific doctor or midwife, you can tell the clerk who scheduled your appointment.

What care does this type of clinician provide? Who can choose this clinician?	Patients without medical or pregnancy complications.			Patients with medical or pregnancy complications.
Does this clinician offer group prenatal care (in a learning setting with other pregnant people)?	Yes, these doctors and midwives offer group care.			No, these doctors do not offer group care.

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Will the clinician who does my pregnancy care be there for the birth of my baby?	A member of the group will be there for the birth of your baby.			
Can this clinician do a cesarean birth (C-section) if I need one?	No, an OB/Gyn doctor working with your midwife would do a cesarean birth.	Yes, all Ob/Gyn doctors can do cesarean births if needed.	Some Family Medicine doctors can do cesarean births.	Yes, all high-risk doctors can do cesarean births if needed.
Can this clinician also provide care for my baby?	No, midwives only care for you.	No, general Ob/Gyn doctors only care for you.	Yes, Family Medicine doctors care for you and your family.	No, high-risk doctors only care for you.

A nurse and your pregnancy care doctor or midwife will help determine whether you need high-risk (Maternal Fetal Medicine) care during your pregnancy. This could occur at the beginning of pregnancy or as the pregnancy progresses if there are concerns.

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
