

# Next Steps for Children with Hearing Loss: A Checklist for Parents

#### In the next few weeks:

- If your child is between the ages of 0 and 3 years old, contact Michigan Early-On to start educational services at 1-800-327-5966. If your child is older, talk to your audiologist about educational recommendations for your child's local school system.
- Schedule follow-up appointments with a pediatric audiologist and an earnose-throat (ENT) doctor to monitor your child's hearing. To make an appointment, contact our call center at 734-936-8051.
- If recommended, talk to your child's audiologist about the use of hearing aids or a bone conduction device. Depending on your child's diagnosis, your audiologist may also discuss an appointment at the Cochlear Implant program.
- Check with your insurance company to find out if hearing aids are a covered benefit. If they are not, talk to your child's audiologist about signing up for Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS) during your child's next appointment. ## In the coming months:

- If you have other children, schedule a hearing test for each child.
  Hearing loss is often genetic. It is important that all siblings have their hearing checked.
- To help your family create the best communication plan for your child, schedule an aural rehabilitation evaluation with an auditory-verbal speech language pathologist. Call 734-998-8119 to schedule an appointment or schedule at check-out after any pediatric otolaryngology or audiology appointment. This evaluation can also help monitor your child's communication development over time.
