

# Medications Used to Treat Heart Arrhythmias

There are many medications that are used to treat, prevent or lessen the severity of irregular heart rhythms (arrhythmias). This group of medications are called **antiarrhythmics**.

#### How do antiarrhythmics work?

Antiarrhythmics work by slowing the electrical impulses in the heart so that your heart can return to a regular rhythm. Your healthcare providers can tell you the purpose of your specific prescriptions. Your medications will likely fall into the categories described in the table below.

Medication type:	How do they work?
Beta Blockers	Slow the heart rate and also block harmful hormones
	(such as adrenalin) that may cause irregular heart
	rhythms.
Calcium Channel	Used to slow the heart rate by preventing calcium from
Blockers	entering the cells of the heart
Potassium Channel	Used to slow the electrical impulses in the heart by
Blockers	preventing potassium from entering the cells of the
	heart.
Sodium Channel	Used to slow electrical conduction in the heart by
Blockers	preventing sodium from entering the cells of the heart.

#### What are my responsibilities when taking an anti-arrhythmic drug?

- Follow all directions on your prescription labels.
- Take your medication at the same time each day.
- Do not miss a dose of your medication.
- If you're taking an extended-release tablet, be sure to swallow the pill whole don't break, chew, or crush it.
- Get your prescription refilled before you run out of medicine completely.
- Talk to your healthcare provider or a pharmacist before starting any new medications.

### What do I do if I miss a dose?

Take the medicine as soon as you can, but skip the missed dose if it is almost time for your next dose. Do not take two doses at one time.
