

## Lymphatic Scan for Lymphedema

## Tell your doctor if you are pregnant or breastfeeding.

You have scheduled a Lymphatic study. This study uses a small amount of radioactive material. The level of radioactivity used is extremely low and has no side effects.

## What will happen during my study?

- 1. We will inject you with a small amount of radioactive material.
  - o If you have legs swelling, we will inject the tops of your feet.
  - o If you have hand swelling we will inject the tops of your hands.
- 2. We will take images 20 minutes after the injections.
  - We will position you on an imaging table, under a special detector called a gamma camera. The camera will be close to the part of your body being imaged. The camera does not produce any radiation and will not cause any pain or discomfort.
- 3. We will take images again either 1 or 2 hours later. Delayed imaging 3 to 4 hours later may be done if necessary.
