

Renogram with Captopril

Tell your doctor if you are pregnant or breastfeeding.

You have scheduled a Renal Study with Captopril®. This study uses a small amount of radioactive material. The level of radioactivity used is extremely low and has no side effects.

How do I prepare for my study?

- You do not need to fast, but do not eat immediately before the study
- Discontinue your blood pressure medication as indicated here.
 - o Captopril® 24 hours minimum, and preferably 48 hours
 - o Enalapril® 72 hours minimum, and preferably 5 days
 - o Lisinopril® 5 days minimum.

Please contact your referring doctor to be sure it is safe for you to be off your medications for these lengths of time.

What happens during the procedure?

- 1. A small amount of a radioactive tracer will be injected through an IV catheter in your arm.
- 2. We will take images for about 30 minutes. We will position you on an imaging table, under a special detector called a gamma camera. The camera will be close to the part of your body being imaged. The camera does not produce any radiation and will not cause any pain or discomfort.
- 3. You will receive a dose of Captopril® dissolved in water. After you have been given Captopril, you will be monitored for 1 hour.

4. A second small amount of radioactive material will be injected into the IV catheter in your arm. We will use the gamma camera to take images again for about 1 hour.
