

PLU SITUATION VERY EN- COURAGING. NO DEATHS

"The Flu situation is encouraging, very encouraging," stated Dr. J. W. Rockefeller, physician in charge of the county quarantine, this morning. However, altho there is a probability that if things go well, the quarantine between county points will be raised some time next week, it is hardly hoped that the epidemic in the state will abate enough to make it safe to raise it against the outside world.

There have been no deaths in the county this week, and the few cases which break out are carefully tended and seem to be in comparatively light form. However, there is danger that at any moment the strange, treacherous disease may appear in virulent cases.

In smaller towns in Colorado and in the East, it continues, with the same deadly toll of death of one in ten who take it. The crowds, gathered celebrating the end of the war, have revived it in places. It did not affect us here, because no one had the germ to spread it. So far, Gunnison is about the only place in the United States almost free from the sickness. We are fortunate, so far, mate that we almost fear it cannot last.

Last night, word was received here that out of the 13 cases of Flu reported at Powderhorn, all of the patients were up except three. The sickness was all at the Duns ranch, and Oscar Duns is still quite ill. The other two still on the sick list are the Misses Arrington and Mendenhall, who are visiting there from the Lake Fork.
