SEVEN NEW CASES OF INFLUENZA HERE

Five civilians in Manhattan have contracted Spanish influenza, the Department of Health was notified yesterday. These are the first civilian cases on record in this city. Two new cases were reported among sailors here.

Health Commissioner Copeland said the disease was likely to spread here and the only thing possible was to instruct the people how best to avoid it. He said the port of New York, though well guarded, could not keep out the malady because it could be communicated to residents by persons who came here by railroad from Boston or other places where the disease is prevalent.

The Department of Health is sending to-day the following letter to all resident physicians:

"Your attention is herewith called to the fact that influenza, acute lobar pneumonia and bronchial or lobular pneumonia have been included among the infectious diseases which are required to be reported by physicians and superintendents of hospitals and dispensaries.

"These diseases were made reportable by action of the Board of Health in amending section 86 of the Sanitary Code. Your attention is called to section 87 of the Sanitary Code, which requires proper isolation of persons affected with infectious disease and such other action as is or may be required by the regulations of the Department of Health.

The seven new cases reported yesterday are now in Roosevelt Hospital. The Commissioner said influenza is not dangerous unless pneumonia is contracted, and that influenza alone, which affects the very old and very young most severely, generally runs its course in from three to four days.

BOSTON HOSPITALS FILL WITH VICTIMS

BOSTON, Sept. 18.—Scores of deaths from the so-called "Spanish influenza" are reported throughout greater Boston to-day. The number of new cases to-day runs high in the hundreds and the total of cases reaches thousands.

Hospitals throughout the district are filled to capacity and it is stated to-night the army authorities are taking over the big Robert Bent Brigham Hospital in Roxbury exclusively for such cases. At the City Hospital,

precautions taken yesterday by camp sanitary officers are believed to have checked a threatened epidemic of Spanish influenza among soldiers here, for while records this evening show 1,500 cases developing in thirty-six weeks, only a small percentage of them are of the virulent type. Only about 200 cases developed to-day.

Approximately 350 cases are being treated at the base hospital. The balance, of lighter type, are being treated in regimental infirmaries and in some cases patients are segregated in barracks under treatment of regimental surgeons. Of five deaths from pneumonia today, three are traceable to influenza.

Many Pupils in Marblehead Schools Are Closed

MARBLEHEAD, Mass., Sept. 18.—With 214 pupils reported ill of influenza the school committee to-day ordered all schools closed for the remainder of the week.

Several New Cases and Near Deaths Near Newport

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 18.—The Department in the first Naval District had the Commandant, Rear Admiral Joseph W. Omand, to rescind to-day the order issued a few days ago forbidding enlisted men to leave Newport without a special pass. In and about this city to-day 241 new cases of influenza were reported, with four deaths.

Argument on the application of John Williamson, a newsdealer at the subway entrance on Jerusalem Street, Brooklyn, for continuance of a temporary injunction restraining Park Commissioner Stephen B. Cropper, because he refused to sell Hearst newspaper, Emanuel E. Quigg, Attorney for Williamson, yesterday told Justice Cropper Williamson had said he was "ashamed" to sell Hearst papers. Quigg contended the revocation of Williamson's license was illegal and arbitrary. Decision was reserved.

Court Opens North Bergen Township to Start Suits

A permanent injunction was granted by the Chancellor of the Superior Court yesterday prohibiting the township authorities and the Police of North Bergen from interfering with the sale and distribution of the New York State Zeitung and its evening and Sunday editions. A resolution prohibiting the circulation of the paper was recently passed by the Township Committee.

NO BITES TWIXT MEALS

Afternoon teas are not approved by Food Administrator Farnham Yardley of the Oranges, a resident of Llewellyn Park, who announced yesterday that in his opinion, people should consider it a patriotic duty to refrain from partaking of food between meals.

The announcement was made in answer to letters from many persons who asked whether it was permissible to serve afternoon tea or other refreshments at social gatherings.
